


## Our Mission

#### Summer Opportunities!

There are several exciting opportunities for our students to be able to continue playing the harp throughout the summer.

For the first time ever, Drew has partnered with the Urban Youth Harp Ensemble to host a summer camp. All current harp students are invited to attend this week-long event, which will be held June 20-24 between the hours of 9 a.m. – noon each day. Carolyn Munford has recruited additional harp instructors to teach throughout the week.

"This camp is a chance for students from different classes to come together in a more relaxed environment," Mrs. Munford said. "We'll be learning lots of pop songs, experimenting with different instruments, and playing music games, all while learning."

The second big event for our harpists is the opportunity to attend the American Harp Society National Conference, which is being held in Atlanta for the first time ever. The AHS is the largest organization of harpists worldwide, and typically sees 500 or more harpists gathering for their conferences every other year. The conference will be held at the Emory Conference Center Hotel from June 30 – July 3, and will feature all-day workshops, concerts, exhibit halls, and networking events.

Thanks to generous donations, 20 of our students have received scholarships to attend the conference free of charge. The Urban Youth Harp Ensemble will be featured performers on the opening day of the concert. In addition, four of our students have been chosen to perform as part of the Honors Ensemble, a select group of some of the best young harpists across the country. The Honors Ensemble will perform alongside world-renowned harpists Bridget Kibbey, Park Stickney, and soprano Indra Thomas. The concert will be held on June 30 at 8 p.m. at the Schwartz Center on Emory University's campus. Tickets can be purchased at the Emory box office.

## Board Member Spotlight: Gwen Ellis

Gwen Ellis' role as a member of the Urban Youth Harp Ensemble Board of Director's was destined. Like several board members and community supporters, Gwen's first experience with the Urban Youth Harp ensemble came at the invitation of long-time friend, Roselyn Lewis. "Knowing my love for music, Rose invited me to a concert. The rest is history," she says.

Gwen brings a rich knowledge of non-profit sector, music education, and corporate work experience to the UYHE Board of Directors. She began her professional journey as a music school teacher and eventually settled into a 39 year career as a Flight Attendant for a major airline. In the midst of her airline work, she worked for a non-profit consulting firm. Gwen's service to the community is just as extensive and impactful as her professional work.

She serves on the Board of Directors for Villages of Carver YMCA, is a member of Clark Atlanta University Guild and the proud Founder & President of Debora H. Boyd Foundation. Gwen also

volunteers with local organizations, like Meals on Wheels, Habitat for Humanity, and Shepherd Spinal Center.

Her passion for music programming began at a young age. Gwen says, "I can't remember a time when music was not part of my life". The personal experience as a music student and teacher, Gwen knows first-hand the benefits to students when they are enrolled in music classes. "Their ability to count, comprehend, and muti-task are enhanced as a result of their participation in music," she says.

Gwen would love to see the UYHE program continue to grow, in popularity, that there will be a waiting list. She says, "Urban Youth Harp Ensemble is a 'jewel' program Atlanta needs to know about and embrace...When you get involved, you help a student dream, you help a student find their creativity."

## Notes from Artistic Director Carolyn Munford

#### Q: Do you have any favorite moments from the past year?

A: One moment that immediately comes to mind is when one of my beginning 6th grade classes was learning an ensemble piece. I divided the class into groups of three and asked that they work together as a team to learn their part. I watched as two of my students helped their third team member learn her part, but the way they taught her was so inspiring to me. They showed so much patience, kindness, and friendship toward her as they all three worked together to play perfectly in harmony. It was a lesson to me to be more patient as a teacher, and a testament to the wonderful character of these students who I am fortunate to teach.

#### Q: How do you keep the students engaged in learning classical music?

A: I have found that students love classical music, if they are prepared to listen in the right way. I try to give context to every piece of music that is played in class by explaining about the composer's life and talking about how this piece of music makes them feel. There is certainly a progression of pieces that I like to use that begins with the classical pieces they have heard before. One of them is Mozart's "A Little Nightmusic", which you'll hear on the concert. These students truly love it and I think that comes across on stage.

Q: What are some ways that parents can support their children's musical study?

A: Our parents do such a wonderful job of supporting these students in their harp studies. Of course, coming to the concerts and praising your children for a job well done, asking about harp class and what pieces they are working on, and encouraging them in all the hard work they do are important. Parents could also encourage them to listen to classical music. YouTube is a great resource to watch performances by other harpists. Here are some artists to look up – Emmanuel Ceysson, Isabelle Moretti, the American Youth Harp Ensemble, and Park Stickney.

Q: This is your chance to brag about your students - what are some of their greatest achievements this year?

A: Several of our students have had notable performances around the community. Zoe Andrews, Kyia O'Neal, and Kimberly Walker performed at the Coretta Scott King birthday celebration at the end of April. Jabari Freeman performed a solo in front of 300 people at the Atlanta Rotary Club, and Payton Gunner and Trinity Mosley are making great strides as members of the Atlanta Symphony Talent Development Program.

Q: What is the best part of teaching young people to play the harp?

A: I love the harp. Learning music and performing has been such an important part of my life, and I feel so fortunate to be able to pass on this love with my students. They are hard-working, joyful, and at times hilarious. We have a lot of fun in the classroom, but the best part is seeing everyone come together on the night of the concert and create beautiful music. Some of the best moments of my life are when I am able to watch my students perform.





# POWER2GIVE




The donations made by community individuals and businesses go a long way to support our school-year programming.
