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Conversation With The Outgoing Chairman

An informal conversation between William "Bill" Stanley and Dzauya Fogle give insight to what has been and the possibilities that lie ahead for the Urban Youth Harp Ensemble. William Stanley was chairman for 14 years. Dzauya has just stepped into her new role.

1. What did you enjoy most about your service as Board Chair? I enjoyed interacting with the young men as they were being developed to play the harp. One of my first experiences was getting Desmond Johnson and Montanez Baugh to and from gigs. I was even instrumental in helping Desmond get accepted to Georgia State University. I also got him on the banquet program for Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity's Conclave when it was here in Atlanta. Many of the students reminded me of my youth and the influence of music in my life. Additionally, the Board was in its infancy and I believe my experience leading boards

helped to shape the Board to be the fully functional organization as it is today.

- **2.** As you look back over the years, what moment with the UYHE that stands out to you? And why? The moment [would be] when I volunteered to purchase a tuxedo for one of the young men who had been adopted by his aunt. I took him to purchase the tux. This is the first time that he has been fitted for clothes. We left the tux for alterations to be picked up on the following weekend. The store had a buy one get one free sale over that weekend. His aunt talked to the store manager and was able to get a suit in addition to the tuxedo. I view it as "God took my gift and doubled it!"
- **3.** Tell us the importance of engaging more young men in the program. What are the challenges? Generally, children that play musical instruments make higher scores in math and science. I believe it's important for all young people to participate in musical programs. The harp is a unique and harp instruction for free is rare. Young men have additional extracurricular activities pulling at them—particularly sports. Unfortunately, there are few male role models on harps unlike other instruments and sports.
- **4.** UYHE has grown in the number of students served. What do you credit that to? The move from Carver High School to Charles R. Drew Charter School created more diversity in the program and the increase from one teacher to two also gave us more capacity. I credit Roselyn Lewis' dedication to program growth as a key factor.
- **5.** Are there any changes or issues you feel that should be a priority within the next year? I am sure that, as our new Chair, you and the Board are in sync with the needs including: increase funding sources; revamping the afterschool program; adding new harps; and increasing our diversity including recruiting more African-American boys.
